



5/4/20 Update

Now that the Governor has declared all schools to remain physically closed through the remainder of the 2019-2020 traditional school calendar, we wanted to update our Distance Learning (DL) plan. Each grade level will reach out to you with additional information as needed for the implementation, but I wanted to go through some of the general information now and highlight some procedural changes that will be in place school wide for the 4th quarter.

First is the **Phase #3 Material Pick Up**. Certain grades will be putting out additional/final materials that parents may pick up for their students on **Friday, May 8th from noon to 3 pm**.

Not every grade will have additional materials needed to be picked up. Again, each grade level will convey this information in their next note to you (if they have not already). We will again follow the "social distancing" guidelines as in our last two pickups. Final days of the school year, ITBS testing options, student pick up of their personal property, and returning of school property will be handled in a future note from the school.

Second is the **grading policy options for 4th quarter**. The difficulty in accurately grading our students with the restrictions of distance learning has led our faculty to explore other options than the typical grading structure in place at RLS. The NC Department of Public Instruction (DPI) as of April 23 has put forth information on how they see statewide grading policies for this extended school closure. Now, this is for public and charter schools, but it is helpful for private and parochial schools as well. The faculty and I have determined that certain aspects of the DPI document makes sense to implement at RLS. Please contact your student's teacher if you have any questions regarding the implementation of these newly adopted grading policies. Let me break it down by grade level below:

Junior Kindergarten: will NOT change its reporting method at this point. The teacher will work to complete her reporting as set forth at the beginning of the year and will be in contact with each family in that regard.

Kindergarten - 3rd Grade: These grades will utilize a three-part grading system. Proficient (C19-P) / Developing (C19-D) / Non-Applicable (N/A). This will be utilized by these grades to show where the student's progress is during the 4th quarter. Proficient means that the student is meeting or exceeding the specified benchmark. Developing means that a student is still developing the skills for that benchmark. Non-Applicable is fairly self evident that this was not measured for the student during 4th quarter.

Grade 3 will still offer Interim grades later this week for 4th Quarter as usual, but they will reflect this "new" system.

4th - 8th Grade: Many of the upper elementary and middle school students have worked incredibly hard on their DL work and are taking great pride in their achievements. Though NCDPI recommends basically not issuing numeric grades for this group of students, we feel it important to reward the hard work of so many and will continue to offer this numeric option. On the other hand, this move to DL has been quite a challenge for many households and the additional unintended stresses that have come about due to the move to DL has led us to offer the following option for these grades.

Students with parent/guardian permission will have two options for each fourth quarter course grade:

1. Numeric grade = just as we have always done and are doing as of now, as will be reflected on the upcoming 4th Quarter Interim Reports due out later this week.
2. Pass/Fail grade = as long as students are meeting the expectations for at least a "D" numeric grade (69% or above) the student would earn a "Pass" grade. Below a 69% would mean a "Fail" grade. This is the option many high schools and colleges are offering to their students.

Some notes on this structure for 4th - 8th Grades:

- 4th Quarter Interims will reflect numeric grades. Please remember, these are not "official records" in the student's file, but a gauge on how the student is doing. It will help the parent determine with the student which option makes sense for them.
- A family may choose a numeric option for some courses and a pass/fail option for others. It does not have to be all of one or the other.
- We will assume you would like to choose the numeric option unless you tell your teacher otherwise by Monday, June 1st. Middle School families, please not only inform the course teacher, but also Robin Hester, Dean of Middle School.
- 8th Graders might wish to keep numeric grades for any course they wish to obtain high school level credit (the Integrated Math 1 comes to mind).

- 6th grade students who would like to be considered for the advanced math courses starting in 7th may also wish to maintain a numeric grade to help in the determination of their math level for next school year.
- Electives/Curriculum Enrichment and PE grades will be noted as Non-Applicable (N/A) for the fourth quarter.
- MS grades will still appear on Sycamore as numeric throughout the quarter whether you have stated a preference for pass/fail or not. They will be converted to P/F at report card time.

We know this DL time has been difficult on all fronts. We have had to make determinations on how we are to deliver the best education we can to you within the restrictions of our staff training and abilities. Each of your student's teachers is great at what they do, teaching students in person. What is a challenge is "retooling" to meet this current crisis. I acknowledge that this is not the best of situations and again thank you for your partnership as we try to navigate this year to its close.

4/24/20 Update

You may be aware that yesterday, April 23, Governor Roy Cooper extended the "Stay at Home" Order for NC until May 8. Today, he ordered all NC Public Schools to remain physically closed through the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year.

The RLS Board of Directors has been discussing this eventuality and has determined that **RLS WILL FOLLOW** the Governor's Executive Order and **NOT PHYSICALLY OPEN** our school doors for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year. We will work to put into place Distance Learning (DL) "Phase #3" for May 18 until the end of scheduled school on June 5.

Very shortly we will present what DL Phase #3 will look like. Though we have been discussing this already, we have our "Phase #2" plan for Distance Learning (DL) in place until May 15, so there is time for us to make sure of the next steps without a "rush" to do so. We appreciate your patience.

I thank you for your support of our teachers and staff as they have worked to support you and your family through this unprecedented time. God often uses difficult or trying circumstances in our lives to refine and teach us. I know that He does not wish us ill or difficulties, but they come in life. What is so amazing about our God is that He uses these difficulties for our betterment in ways that usually are incomprehensible to us during the time of trial.

Please reach out to us if we can be of assistance to you and know that the patience and understanding we are asking for ourselves we extend to you as well. Thank you for your partnership.

4/3/20 Update

Well, we made it. To Spring Break that is. I don't know about you, but I do need a bit of a break from all the stress of running the Distance Learning Plan and just figuring out day-to-day existence in this "new normal". Try to do just that, take a break. Go outside and enjoy this beautiful weather with the kids. Find an appropriate way to do something fun outside of the house. Plan a virtual worship activity or enjoy a virtual Easter Egg hunt (our friends at Jordan Lutheran in Apex have one planned - see the Lion's Tale for details or go to this link: www.Jordanapex.org/egg-hunt (direct link to the printable resources and video links)). **No evaluated work is required over the Break**, though many teachers have provided extension links and enrichment activities which you may wish to utilize should you want some more things for your child to do over the Break.

If we were following our original Phase #1 plan for DL we would be returning to school on Tuesday, April 14. With the Governor's Executive Order we know that the **earliest we may be returning is Monday, May 18**. Phase #2 for DL will be implemented after the Break. Teachers will be reaching out to you with details for this Phase #2 (if they have not already) over the Break. Middle School families will have an "electronic packet" of information sent by me with course syllabi and "rules of the road" information on expectations and evaluation standards now that we know DL is being extended. All the teachers are working for continuity and what is working best for their class in this changing environment. Every teacher has worked for ways they can still keep in touch with your children and give them the "feel" of school yet. We are offering suggestions for scheduling your child's school day at home. Feel free to reach out to your child's teacher should you have questions or concerns. We are striving to meet needs wherever we can. Thank you for working alongside us.

At this point we have NOT made any changes to our grading scales/structure though if the school schedule is further altered we very well may. We will keep you up to date on any changes that get put in place should they happen. You will be receiving electronic 3rd quarter report cards at the end of the Break. These should look very traditional to you as the vast majority of 3rd quarter was done traditionally and the remaining grades are being gathered through Phase #1 of the DL Plan.

That is it for now, please keep yourselves safe and healthy. I'm looking forward to this Monday when, God willing, my son and I can come out of self-quarantine (though where are we really going to go anyway?) and the rest of our family can finally come home with us. Thank you again for your prayers and well-wishes, know that our staff is praying for you and your family.

3/27/20 Update

I pray this note finds you and yours doing well during this trying time for all of us. I want to thank you for all the support and encouragement you have been giving me and the teachers. No one could have predicted the need to completely retool our method of distributing our content even a month ago, but here we are. We also thank you for your constructive input on how we can refine our methods of Distance Learning. In meeting with the staff yesterday via Zoom, we are working to implement many of the suggestions to give us more consistency and structure to our DL for you.

With the Governor's Executive Order for **schools to remain closed until at least May 15**, we need to update our Distance Learning Plan. We, of course, are abiding by the Governor's order and it is our hope that the medical crisis will have abated by then and we will be able to **return to physical schooling on Monday, May 18**.

REFINEMENTS TO DL:

As mentioned earlier, we are working to refine our methods as this hiatus has lengthened into much more than just through Spring Break. Grades 1 to 8 will convert to utilizing Google Classroom, if they are not already using that platform, after the Spring Break (starting April 14). All assignments will be posted to the Google Classroom site for the upcoming week no later than Monday at 9 am (many will post by Sunday night). That should help your student plan out his/her week. Teachers will be reaching out to you with a "sample schedule" for your student. This is an option to help you structure their day. If you have an alternative that is working better for you, that is fine. Teachers are working to minimize the notices and emails that have been coming out (much of this is due to some settings in Google Classroom), but will still work to get you pertinent information on expectations and grading methods. Teachers are reaching out with "virtual" ways to meet with students, most utilizing Zoom.

SCHEDULE:

Third Quarter technically came to an end, Wednesday, March 25. Teachers have until Friday, April 3 to get grades in for that quarter. Danielle Altieri will take the grades submitted and issue you electronic report cards after Spring Break. As of now, we plan to return to school on Monday, May 18 and go through our stated last day of school, Friday, June 5. We plan to BE IN SESSION Monday, May 25, and utilize FULL DAYS on Thursday, June 4 and Friday, June 5. We will still utilize the first "phase" of the DL plan sent to you back on March 15, which stated that DL will take place until April 3 and we will observe Spring Break as scheduled, April 6 to 13. This is a needed break for our faculty to continue to retool for the extended DL through May 15. Many of the teachers are putting in significantly more than the time they put in as an in school teacher and need this time to prep for the next step and get some much needed rest. Most have already sent you some non-graded alternatives to help keep your student "busy" over this break, but you may find that a break from the work cycle is a welcomed respite as well.

MATERIALS PICK UP #2:

Many of the older grades have all the materials they would need from school for this additional time away as they can be more easily supplemented electronically, but not so for the early elementary. The early elementary teachers are preparing additional “packets” for the students to take them through May 15. **Kindergarten, First, and Second Grades all have “new” packets prepared for you for pick up at the school office** (similar to how we did it back on March 18). Grades 4 and 5 have some materials that you MAY pick up, but there may be alternatives that can be utilized in lieu of your stopping by. Junior Kindergarten, Grade 3, and the Middle School Grades DO NOT have any additional materials that need picking up. The teachers will reach out to you with more information on the packet pick up and alternatives.

PACKET PICK UP DATE #2 is MONDAY, MARCH 30, FROM NOON TO 3 PM.

This only applies to the grades noted above. We realize Wake County is going to a “Stay at Home” order as of Friday and if your grade is scheduled for a packet pick up and you can not make that time please reach out to Rosie Creasy at rosiecreasy@rlscary.org and we will arrange an alternative method of getting you the materials.

3/23/20 Update

By now I’m sure many of you have heard of Governor Cooper’s decision to close all public schools in North Carolina through May 15. As you know RLS’s plan for closure only took us through the end of Spring Break on April 13, though we were all aware that this situation could very well evolve into a longer shut down of schools. We now need to respond to the Governor’s call with our own reasoned plan of action that will best serve our RLS community. Know that I have already reached out to our Faculty and Board of Directors and we are actively working on the “second stage” to the Distance Learning (DL) plan already put forward last week. That DL plan is still in effect through Spring Break. We will be in touch with you very soon with more.

It is my hope that these significant days that we find ourselves in will bring us closer to God and his Providence. Do not hesitate to reach out to me or any on the staff. We are in this TOGETHER.

Finally, I want to thank all of those who have reached out to me and my family recently. As some of you may know, my son Sam was working in Madrid, Spain as an English-speaking Teaching Assistant in a Spanish High School this year. His school also was put on hiatus, but he had been working from home providing content for their version of DL. My wife and I were getting more and more concerned that he may end up being stranded in Spain if we did not get him home to North Carolina soon. We were able to do just that and last night he landed at RDU.

As much as my wife Jenny and I wanted to hug him, we knew we could not and we provided a method of getting him home without any physical contact with us whatsoever. He is now in "self-quarantine" (he is fine by the way, no fever, feeling well) in our basement "in-law" suite while I am also now out of an abundance of caution in self-quarantine on the first floor of our home. My wife and two daughters are staying in other safe locations, isolating themselves so as not to have to self-quarantine. My apologies if I have not gotten back to any individual email I have received from you over the weekend or today yet as I have been working hard to prepare a place for my son, work through the quarantine steps, and now respond to Governor Cooper's Executive Orders (as well as trying to keep up with my three DL classes that I'm teaching). Still awaiting this "slow down" everyone is talking about!

God is Good and He will see us through. Thank you for your partnership and prayers.

3/16/20 Update

Another eventful day. I truly pray for peace for you and your family. We will get through this! I am sharing a devotion I shared with our staff today at the end of this note. Know that God is aware of our troubles and we at RLS want to help you as well. Do not hesitate to reach out.

A productive meeting with your teachers today. They are all excited about starting Distance Learning (DL) with your students. What an adventure!

A few things to bear in mind. Teachers will be in contact with you regarding how to implement DL by the end of the school day on Wednesday (maybe before!). Wednesday, March 18 from 9 am to 3 pm has been set aside as a time you may enter the school to pick up additional materials the teachers have set out or perhaps pick up materials that were sent home last Friday, but you were unable to receive. The teachers will note if there are any additional resources put out in their note to you.

Many teachers have some "electronic component" to their DL. This is rarely, if ever, something that has a specific timed encounter (like a Skype meeting, etc.). If you are "sharing" your electronic devices with your student at home that should not be a problem at all. Most just need to be able to check their email at some point in the day

and respond within 24 hours or so. If you find you are in a position where the teacher's DL plan causes you concern from a device perspective, please reach out to Danielle Altieri (daniellealtieri@rlscary.org) and we will see what can be done.

Many teachers will be instituting "office hours" when you know your student can get a hold of them for questions, etc. In the School Office we will also be checking phone messages from the general office boxes and keeping reduced office hours as well. More information on calendar items will be forthcoming in the next few days from the office too. We are striving to stay as in touch with you as possible, but certain items are just not settled yet or may change significantly depending on how this situation evolves.

3/15/20 Update

What a tumultuous couple of days. Representatives of the RLS Board of Directors, RLS Staff, and our Pastor just met to continue to evolve the RLS plan for the next couple of weeks. Let me break it down for you here.

1. Monday, March 16 and Tuesday, March 17 will be Teacher Workdays at RLS (no students on campus). We will be working on further extended "distance" learning plans.
2. Wednesday, March 18, RLS Distance Learning to begin by the end of day. Parents may stop in to the school building (9am to 3 pm) to collect additional materials (especially if they were not able to pick up materials sent home on Friday, March 13). RLS teachers will be in contact with families with instructions on how to implement Distance Learning for their classes by end of this day.
3. Distance Learning practices will be in place through Friday, April 3rd.
4. At this point, Spring Break will be occurring AS SCHEDULED (Monday, April 6 through Monday, April 13). This is subject to change if necessary. You will be updated to any change as soon as possible.*
5. Tuesday, April 14 = return to regular school operation (projected, subject to change as needed, again updates to come home asap if this needs to be changed).

The Board of Directors realize that this is an ever evolving situation and that extending the school year, changing ITBS standardized testing dates, issuing of report cards for the end of third quarter all are somewhat in flux right now. Please be patient as the Board works to sort through these items. Much will be determined by what happens in the next couple of weeks with the virus.

*Please note that during the Spring Break time the expectation is that any RLS families traveling abroad or taking a cruise must inform the school and complete a 14-day self-quarantine before being eligible to return to school. A self-quarantine means a student

would remain at home during this period. Please use your best judgment on any travel, even in state, as we are trying to keep all safe at RLS.

3/14/20 Update

RLS WILL FOLLOW the Wake County Public School System decision to close school buildings starting Monday, March 16 through AT LEAST Friday, March 27.

Teachers have sent home school material with your student on Friday in case of this contingency. Teachers will be in contact with you via email no later than end of business on Wednesday, March 18 with more information for you as to how and when to utilize this material. At this point the plan is for the school building to be open to parents on Wednesday, March 18 who need to stop in for additional materials set out by teachers for their students. This time frame may be able to be advanced. Please wait for more information from your teacher or the school office. I will be sending you more information on how the calendar will work with the adjustments. The RLS Board of Directors will still be meeting tomorrow (Sunday, March 15) to work on scheduling details. Thank you for those who took the time to respond to the Board's quick survey that was just sent out an hour or so ago before the Wake Co. decision. Stay tuned for more information to follow.

We turn to God in times of stress and know that He gives the peace that passes all understanding. I pray this for you and yours during these anxious times. We will get through this all together (even if together means via text and email for a while!).

3/13/20 Update

I want to give you the latest update on the Coronavirus situation as it relates to RLS. You may be aware that three local school systems (Durham, Chapel Hill/Carrboro, and Orange County) have announced school calendar changes, interrupting regular school operations starting Monday, March 16. At this point (Friday, March 13 at 5 pm) Wake County Public Schools have NOT altered their calendar.

RLS has NOT had any reports of the virus in our preschool, school, or families at this time. Remember, Wake County officials will contact anyone who they suspect may have been exposed to the virus.

RLS leadership is constantly monitoring this evolving situation and working to make the best decisions for our school children, families, and staff. We will at least follow Wake County guidelines, but we may well move more aggressively than Wake County. School materials were sent home with your child today in case the decision is made to close the school building as early as our next scheduled school day, Monday, March 16. These materials are not meant to be accomplished this weekend. They are the first

part of a contingency plan. Your child's teacher will be contacting you with instructions for these materials should that be necessary.

The RLS Board of Directors has been called into a special session this Sunday. At that time, a determination on the school calendar will be made. Any change in school schedule will be shared with you as soon as possible following this meeting. If there are necessary updates before that time, we will apprise you by email and or text.

Our Preschool Director, Diane Hooper, shared a link the NC PTA provided as a resource in helping to discuss the Coronavirus with children. Feel free to check it out and utilize it at your own discretion. The link is from the National Association of School Psychologists.

3/11/20 Update

You may have heard that Governor Roy Cooper declared a state of emergency to help mitigate the spread of Covid-19 and that three area private schools have made some temporary closing decisions related to the Coronavirus concerns. I wanted to give you an update on RLS' preparedness for Coronavirus and give you a link to the latest Wake County Public Schools message.

We have NOT had any reports of the virus in our school or families so are NOT making any closing notices at this time. Remember, Wake County Health Officials will contact anyone who they suspect may have been exposed to the virus. We continue to use enhanced cleaning measures, stress good hand hygiene, covering our coughs, and staying home when not feeling well. We have also instituted some changes to our core class library and school library policies/procedures.

We also have replaced the faucet handles in our elementary and middle school hallway bathrooms. The old faucets used a "cartridge" to stay on for a brief bit of time to allow a person to wash, but then shut off so the water could not be accidentally left on. The concern was that this was not giving sufficient time for the hand washing to be effective, especially if you were awaiting warm/hot water. We have replaced these with more traditional faucet handles. The only "catch" is that one must remember to shut them off manually. Please help remind your student of that!

In the note it stresses that state officials have specifically recommended that schools NOT be closed. Wake County has also made some decisions regarding school events and travel. We at RLS are looking at those restrictions and have cancelled some of our field trips as well.

As always, we look to God as our protector and our rock. With good preparation and sound faith we move forward under His protection. Blessings to you.

3/6/20 Update

You may have heard that the victim of the first confirmed case of Coronavirus in Wake County has been tied to some local institutions (restaurants, churches, etc.). It has been reported that he is a member of a local Lutheran Church. I want you all to know that it is not our parent church, but another in our community. Since you don't hear of Lutheran Churches in the news that often, I wanted to just make sure all was clear.

Secondly, Wake County Public Schools have sent out an update which I thought was informative so I would like to share it with you. You may find it at <https://www.wcpss.net/coronavirus>

Some of the "highlights" of the message are that a Wake County Public Health Division official would contact anyone they deem at risk of exposure to Covid-19. If someone has not been contacted and they are not showing symptoms, they do not need to isolate themselves or take precautions beyond the norm (washing of hands, covering their cough, staying home if they feel sick). Also state and federal law prohibits a school from sharing confidential information about students and employees, like health status, etc. I don't see this as an "issue" at our school, but it is good to realize.

Finally, I wanted to let you all know about some other changes we are making to help reduce the risk of transmission of this or any other illness in our school. We have instituted some changes in our Library program for the time being. Normally, the students would sit in a circle on the rug in the library and check out books (and even snuggle some stuffed animals that "live" in the library) taking them home and returning them in due course. Books and rugs (and stuffed animals) are very hard to disinfect (not being "hard" surfaces) and these spaces and items would be visited by multiple classes and taken to and from our facility normally. We feel we should curtail those things for now.

What will happen is that our library staff will visit the elementary classrooms instead, reading to the students, and/or bringing library curriculum items along with them. This should help contain things to individual classrooms and not risk exposure of one class to each other with these "soft" items. Again, just precautionary, not response to any particular concern.

Basically, any “soft” items will be relegated to each classroom, not shared among them. As much as possible, we plan to have students use only items put for their individual use. This is not always 100% possible, but when an item is shared (like a computer keyboard), it is cleaned regularly.

3/4/20 Update

The Coronavirus (Covid-19) has been making news for a while now and as of yesterday, the first confirmed case has been found in Wake County. The safety of our students, staff, and families is our top priority. I want to assure you that we at Resurrection are closely monitoring the situation.

First, it is important to have the facts on Coronavirus. This will help you stay informed while staying out of the “weeds” of misinformation/speculation. We recommend the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention website <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/index.html> and the World Health Organization website <https://www.who.int/emergencies/diseases/novel-coronavirus-2019> for the most up-to-date information. Another site that may help explain things to students (likely 3rd grade on up) is this “Brainpop” video. <https://www.brainpop.com/health/diseasesinjuriesandconditions/coronavirus/> It does a nice job of bringing the facts to the kid’s level.

Second, we are big believers in preparation. The best way to keep our school as virus free as possible is to follow the CDC guidelines.

- Good hand hygiene
 - washing frequently with antibacterial soap
 - <https://www.cdc.gov/handwashing/>
 - coughing/sneezing into elbow not hand
 - avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth
- Avoid contact with people who are sick (whether Coronavirus or not)
 - If your child is not feeling well, has a cough or flu-like symptoms, has a fever or used fever-reducing medication in the past 24 hours, please keep them home.
 - If you are concerned that anyone in your household may have been exposed to the Coronavirus, you should call your medical provider.
- School Cleanliness
 - We will continue to proactively clean and follow CDC and health guidelines emphasizing the importance of good hygiene practices.
 - Daily emphasis on cleaning of classrooms and restrooms.
 - We have put in place enhanced cleaning measures to try to address “common”/public areas of our school.

Third is contingency planning. In the event the state or local government calls for any disruption in public gatherings, such as in schools, we will follow these experts' recommendations. Should there be any sizable disruption, our staff is working on action planning to enable the least amount of impact on our students and families.

Finally, often it is the “unknown” that can cause the most concern in cases like this. Finding out the facts, preparing smartly, and trusting in our officials should give us peace of mind. Furthermore, we know that as people of faith our God is in control. I'll leave you with a word from I Peter 5:7, “Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you.”

Responding to the Coronavirus (COVID-19)

The safety of our staff, students and families is our top priority.

In the event of a local case of Coronavirus (COVID-19), we will follow the guidelines and recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
